

RULES RELATING TO RESALE CERTIFICATES

Northlake Hills Property Owners Association, Inc. Effective September 1, 2021

- Resale Certificates. This policy applies to any Resale Certificate (Certificate), as described in Texas Property Code § 207.003.
- The standard charge for a new Certificate or updated Certificate is \$75 and will be produced within five (5) business days. If a Certificate or Statement of Account is required on less than five (5) business days notice but more than three (3) business days notice, the charge will be increased by 50%. If a Certificate or Statement is requested on less than three (3) business days notice, the charge will be increased by 100%.
- Payment. The parties to the sale may agree between themselves as to who shall have primary 3. responsibility for paying for the Certificate or Statement. If the Association does not receive full payment, however (for example, dishonored check), the new property owner shall be responsible for the fee, and the Association shall be entitled to charge the owner's account for the same.
- Known Violations. The Certificate will describe violations that are shown in the property file. If 4. the Association is not asked to inspect the property, the Certificate will contain language substantially as follows:

The Association did not inspect the property or enter upon the lot, and the information contained in this certificate is based only on the contents of the property file. If a violation is later discovered, the then-owner of the lot will be responsible for correcting the violation, even if the violation preexisted his/her purchase of the lot.

Inspection on Request. Upon receipt of written authorization by the seller/owner at least 5. business days prior to closing, the Association will enter the lot to inspect it. In that event, the Certificate will contain language substantially as follows:

> The Association entered on the lot to inspect it on or about [date], and noted [no violations] [the following violations: ____].

- Individuals who purchase a lot will be responsible for all Liability of Subsequent Owners. preexisting violations to the same extent as the previous owner, unless the Association issued a Certificate for the purchase transaction and the Certificate failed to disclose (a) a known violation, (b) a violation that existed at the time of the inspection and was readily visible from the street in front of the lot, or (c) a violation that was open and obvious when the Association conducted an inspection pursuant to paragraph 5 above.
- Exemptions. Certificates shall not be required in circumstances described in Texas Property Code 7.

§ 5.008(e)(1) - (4) and (6) - (10). These include foreclosure sales, sales by a bankruptcy trustee, and sales among co-owners, or between spouses incident to a divorce. Purchasers and their successors will be responsible for eliminating/correcting pre-existing violations.

Governing Law. Adopted by incorporation are provisions with respect to Certificates set forth in 8. Texas Property Code § 207.003.
